Maximize your impact with matching scholarship dollars for NDSU engineers

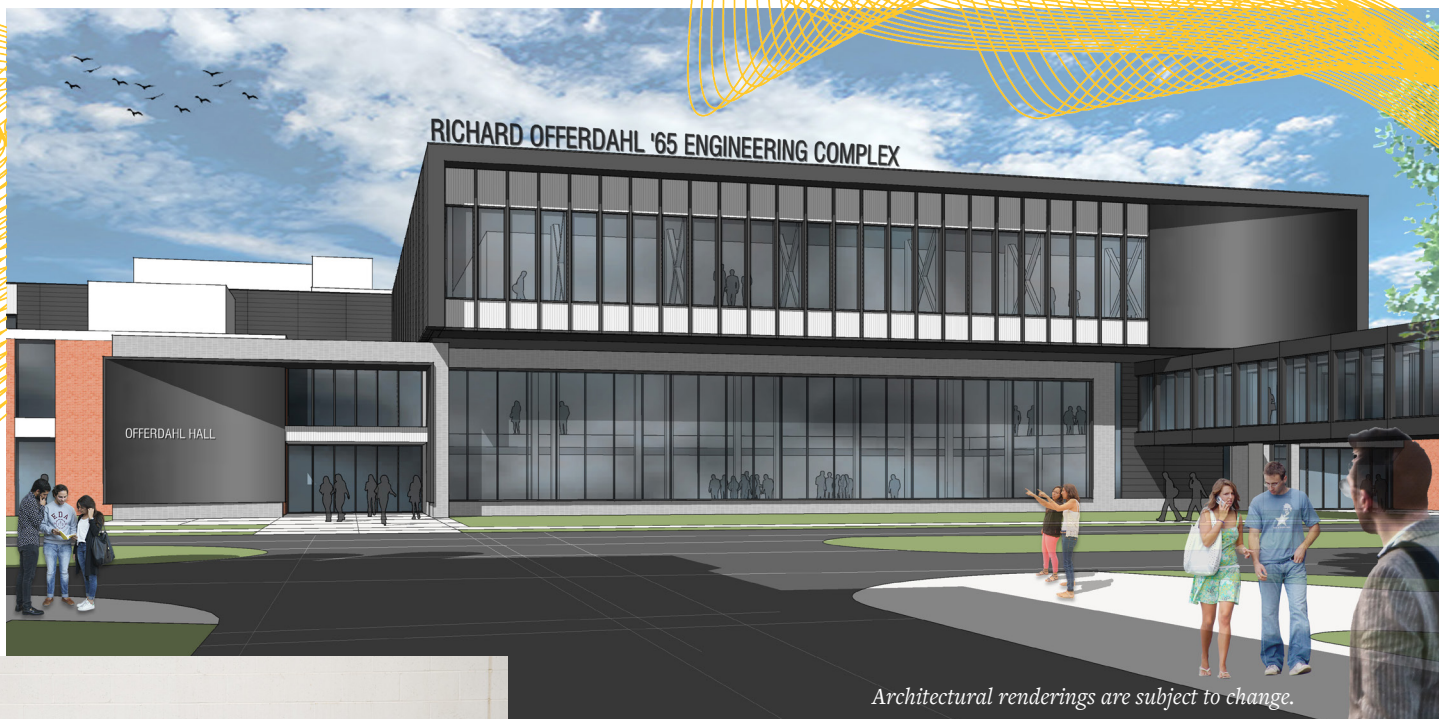

During this momentous time for NDSU's College of Engineering, Dave '83 and Pat '83 Goodin are investing in their passion area — student scholarships — and inviting you to join them in support of NDSU engineering and computational science students through the Goodin Match.

Your gift of \$50,000 or more to a new or existing endowed scholarship fund for NDSU students who are pursuing a degree in the College of Engineering will unlock an additional 50% in matching funds from the Goodin Match. These matching funds, totaling \$1 million, will be available until the funds have been exhausted or until Dec. 31, 2024 — whichever occurs first.

* To unlock Goodin Match dollars, benefactors must invest or pledge a minimum of \$50,000. Goodin Match dollars will be available up to a maximum investment or pledge of \$200,000.
